- Conduct rigorous research to identify, investigate, and disseminate evidence-based practices (EBPs) for students with disabilities
- Effectively teach pre-service special educators and other stakeholders to identify, adapt, and implement EBPs
- Engage in service to the profession and university to support the identification, dissemination, adaptation, and implementation of EBPs
